CLUB CHAIR'S REPORT

Dear Grafton United members,

I welcome the opportunity to present my fifth chair's report and 162nd of the Grafton United Cricket Club.

Overview

During the 2023/24 season, Grafton United enabled over 5,000 Aucklanders to experience the social and physical benefits of cricket. Your club stands proudly within the Auckland and New Zealand cricket communities.

The GUCC junior club saw over 518 junior members participant in cricket. This season saw us continue our school programmes with visits to 16 schools helping thousands more Aucklanders to experience cricket. Our senior numbers were stable with 15 teams.

A real highlight of the season has been our return to women's cricket - it had been a decade since our last side, so it has been wonderful to see our Premier Reserve Women's lionesses come through from our junior ranks into senior cricket.

Our Premier Men's side gaining promotion to the top flight of two-day cricket after winning the Tom Hellaby Trophy was also a stand out.

Continuing our strategy to provide fit-for-purpose facilities, we invested in our indoor school with replacement nets and re-engineering. This was enabled through greater focus and success with grant funding applications.

Playing

The season saw some big championship wins and recognition.

Congratulations to the six senior teams who brought home championships - Premier Reserve Women, Premier Men, Friends XI, Allan's XI, Incredibles Gold and the Beige Brigade.

It was a huge thrill to see the Lionesses win a title in their first season of senior cricket, and also share in the Premier Men's two-day title achievement up in Hibiscus Coast on a rain affected last day of the season. Both teams represented Grafton proudly.

Topping off the season, Grafton saw success at the Auckland Cricket awards:

- Taine Bayly was named the Men's Club Cricketer of the Year with 45 wickets and 531 middle order runs
- Brad Morrow was awarded Community Coach of the Year for his efforts above and beyond for the U11
 Jaguars and a JT Sparling side.

Well done to those who reached big milestones or higher honours -

The Premiers added three new baggy cap wearers:

- Baggy #179: Jack Duffy
- Baggy #180: Taine Bayly also played a match for Auckland A.
- Baggy #181: Raja Sandhu

Special Grafton United baggy caps were also awarded to three legendary lions in recognition of their contribution to the premier side and wider club - Mike De Lautour (#65), Stewart Wilson MNZM (#92) and Thushan Dodampegamage (special recipient for coaching contribution).

Fellow baggy wearers brought up rare playing milestones - Nikheil Bhana (150 Premier matches), Dylan Taylor and Alex Edwards (both 100 Premier matches).

Another trio represented Tāmaki Makaurau Māori - Ben Brady, Fraser Campbell and Jack Duffy.



We also had a host of age group Auckland reps from different generations:

- Championship winning Auckland U17 Girls: Charli Dunn and Casey McAnulty
- Championship winning Auckland Over 40s: Farhan Mirza, Vishal Dube and Ryan Thakar
- Auckland Over 50s: Thushan Dodampegamage, Ben Handy and Stephen Schaapveld
- Auckland Over 60's: Peter Meads.

Farhan Mirza of the Beige Brigade went on to represent New Zealand in the Over 40s World Cup in Cape Town, appearing in the grand final against eventual champions South Africa. Fizz took 9 wickets (including 5 against India) at an average of 16.1 in 5 appearances. To acknowledge Grafton's support of his campaign, he gifted the club a stump from the grand final.

During the season, I was part of an Auckland Cricket grade cricket review working group that sought to ensure we are delivering fit-for-purpose competitions. As a result, the 2024/25 season will see new competitions for current third to fifth grade sides. While there will be some adjustment, I believe these competitions are an exciting change with multiple playing formats and finals cricket - every day of cricket will be meaningful and more likely to get a result.

Our junior committee, coordinators, coaches and managers did an amazing job to provide cricket for our younger members. Thank you all. You can read more about the season in our senior club captains report, Garrick Sutherland's junior chair report and our coordinators other reports in this booklet.

Governance

I am grateful for the guidance and support of an experienced board, both in and out of cricket.

You are well served by your board, with each board member having oversight of a key area - Stewart Wilson (President, Trust and clubrooms); Mark Bird (Chair, ACA, staffing); Peter Meads (Hon Treasurer, finance); Mike Currie (Hon Secretary, fundraising); Alastair Lee (judiciary, women and girls cricket); Martin Webster (grants); Bridget Smith (juniors and sponsorship); Hiren Patel (Indo-Kiwi and seniors); Ross Deans (seniors); Glenn Horne (grounds and facilities); and Garrick Sutherland (junior chair, EDCA).

An addition to the board was Garrick Sutherland, who continued into his second season as Junior Chair. Alongside Bridget Smith, Garrick Sutherland represents our junior club.

Finance

As you will see later in this report, the club made a loss of \$9,275 driven by investment in our indoor school and the postponement of the Super Sixes. Despite this, the club is financially secure. My thanks to Honourable Treasurer Peter Meads for his continued oversight in this area of the club, a role he has done for 20 years.

Unlocking grant funding to support projects has been a focus and continues to be an opportunity area for the club. We doubled the number of applications year-on-year and receiving three grants, exceeding our target.

Despite this, we are seeking further support to advance the indoor school upgrade. If you are able, we would be incredibly grateful for your donation, either directly to the club or via the Grafton Cricket Development Trust. Details are at graftoncricket.co.nz/donate.

On behalf of the club, I would like to thank Auckland Cricket for their ongoing support of the community game through the Club is the Hub programme.

Grounds and Facilities

The board continues to actively engages with Auckland Council and the Waitematā Local Board over Victoria Park, the clubrooms and Cox's Bay.

The Victoria Park Sports and Cultural Trust (VSP&CT) has successfully renewed the clubroom lease on our behalf. This included formalisation of the VSP&CT's ownership of the building. This positions the club well for whatever



the future (stadium or not!) may hold for Victoria Park. My thanks to VSP&CT board members, including Nicholas Albrecht, Stewart Wilson and Alastair Lee.

We continue to take a stewardship position and work proactively to highlight the needs of our club, organised sports and recreation for the local community. Our ongoing position is that Victoria Park's primary purpose is sport and recreation.

The commercial music event Plane Sailing is likely to return in January 2025. We objected to this event given previous sport fields damage. A more extensive ground protection plan has been designed. We will continue to focus on limiting the impact and pushing for any damage to be rapidly remediated.

As part of our strategy to provide fit for purpose facilities we are investing in our indoor school. Stage 1 included net replacement and net rails re-engineering. A modern booking system will follow during the offseason. We want a facility that we're all proud of, is safer, and gets better utilisation across the community.

Club Management

Alongside Phil Dunn and Tanya Reynolds in the office, the team was joined by new junior coach Mishaan Doolabh. It is great to have such a passionate coach on his journey and involved in developing the cricketing potential of our young members.

This is part of our continued focus in coaching which provides our players with opportunities to develop their skills. We now have four professional coaches - Mish, Raja and Thush were joined by Nikheil Bhana, our Women's coach.

As you will see later in our report, Phil has executed a business plan aligned to our strategic plan, with a particular highlight being his leadership of the indoor school project and increased grant success.

I want to acknowledge and give a big thanks to Phil, Tanya, Mish and the team for their tireless contribution to Grafton United.

Thank you

On behalf of the club, I want to thank everyone who has played, coached, captained, scored, umpired, organised and supported. A special thanks to our board, committees and volunteers who shared their Grafton spirit, time and skills with the club.

Grafton United remains grateful to our sponsors and funders. Thank you to Steve and New World Victoria Park team; Jarrod and the Cricket Express team; Andrew, Hannah and the Behemoth Brewing Company team; and all our other club sponsors - you will find details of them in this annual report. I ask members to support these local businesses who support us.

3rd and 4th XI Club Captain Report

Another highly enjoyable and enriching season of cricket under the belt. For my group (which is largely the 3rd and 4th XI squad) it was characterized by big highs and big lows. The results themselves were somewhat disappointing for teams that were both at the top of grade last season.

4th XI had been in position to win the comp halfway through, and certainly held their ground finishing mid table. Given the team was promoted up 2 grades from 6th to 4th grade, this was basically a satisfying result. However, I know Ravi and the boys backed themselves to win it.

Highlights being two derby wins against Friends XI - which is a great achievement given Friends' XI standing as back to back 4th grade champions. Winning became near impossible following the bans handed to the team and several key players following a "passionate episode" late in a game vs Suburbs New Lynn, which was contrary to standards of conduct. This incident was a valuable catalyst for some deep discussions in the group around the way we play our cricket, and it has made us stronger.

3rd XI never really got off the ground and narrowly avoided a bottom place finish in 3rd grade. There were many factors contributing to our demise last season. From a high level I think the team is in a transition and is seeking an identity which befits all its players. There were lots of good ideas and intentions across our playing group and a very good level of skill, however these always seemed to work at odds with the ideas and intentions of others and



we lost critical moments in games. I would also suggest the level of competition in the grade was higher than it had been in previous years. There are some adjustments needed in the way of playing cricket. As always adversity is a great catalyst for development.

In general, the group continues to grow and flourish with each season as we establish leaders and key components. Our preseason was very strong and the turnout of players and level of commitment was brilliant. As I have reported previously, we are very much a values-based group - and what matters most to us is sharing the community of our brothers and enjoying our sport in the spirit of good fair competition. Special mention to Mark Bird for his overseeing and support which is highly appreciated. And to our captains Ravi Pal and Tyler Haslemore who carried the flag superbly for the club.

JUNIOR CHAIR'S REPORT

It is with immense pleasure that I present the season report for our Junior Club's 2023/24 season. Once again, we have witnessed a strong and successful season for our junior cricketers.

This season, we were thrilled to have 468 registered players, forming a total of 51 teams within our junior club. Additionally, we facilitated 52 cricketers who represented Waiheke Island under the administration of Grafton. It is encouraging to note continued growth in our numbers, particularly among our youngest players in the Year 1-2 grade and Year 4 grade, indicating significant development.

Our youngest members begin their journey by learning the basics in our Cub program on Thursday evenings at Cox's Bay. They then progress through our Saturday morning softball grades. Starting from Year 5 (Under 10), our teams transition to hard ball cricket and engage in matches against clubs outside our district. At the Under 12 level, our players have the opportunity to experience afternoon cricket, playing extended 30-over matches.

We welcomed to the club our new Junior Coach, Mishaan Doolabh, who brings amazing energy, passion, and the latest coaching techniques and skills. It was fantastic to see Mish jump right in from the get-go and support our parent coaches with great advice and mentorship. He brought the community together with his ability to share ideas and methods with the team.

Girls' cricket continues to grow, with participation starting in mixed junior grades and migrating to school or friendship-based teams in the Under 11s competition, where we have 3 teams. Then progressing through to Under 13s and Under 16s Auckland Cricket competitions. This is a key area of focus for the junior club to continue to foster and strengthen.

Our Sunday cricket program includes composite age group teams that compete in the JT Sparling Super Series against Parnell, University, Cornwall, and Howick Pakuranga. Our Under 11 Black team, in particular, has continued their success, maintaining an unbeaten record and securing the U11s title.

A highlight of this season was our U11 Jaguars and U11 JTS Black team coach, Brad Morrow, winning Auckland Cricket Community Coach of the Year. This award recognizes him going above and beyond as a team coach.

"Brad has a knack for spreadsheets that allows him to pinpoint areas of improvement and tailor his coaching, resulting in remarkable development and growth of the players. Always going the extra mile for his players, our winner showcases genuine care, consideration, and passion to inspire teams at Grafton United Cricket Club."

We increased our Friday night events this season to great success and feedback. Thank you to the senior club and senior teams for their support and great work on the BBQ. Our Jr coach Mish ran a fantastic girls' blitz evening, attracting over 30 girls and creating an electric atmosphere!

This year, our prize-giving ceremony was held in the evening after the final evenings play at Cox's Bay, providing a fitting stage to honour players who excelled in their teams. Congratulations to the raffle winners, and we express our deep appreciation to our sponsors for their continued support.

In January, several of our teams represented the club at the Hawkes Bay cricket camps, providing invaluable experience on grass wickets in a tour environment.

TREASURER'S REPORT

For the Twelve Months Ended 30 April 2024

I am pleased to present the financial reports of the Grafton United Cricket Club (Inc.) for the year ended 30 April 2024. It should be noted that at the time of preparing the annual report the annual review had not been signed off.

The enclosed financial statements show that the club generated a loss for the year of \$9,274.

It should be noted that there is a loan from the Eastern Districts Cricket Association of \$25,000. This is being treated as a liability in the accounts. The loan may convert to income a later date but as at Balance Date we had not meet all of the conditions of the loan to allow conversion to income.

Our budget for the 2024 year has not yet been finalised. The ACA has confirmed that our grant for the 2024 year will be similar the grant we received in the 2024 year.

Our cash position decreased during the financial year by \$57,175 (2022 increase, \$6,630). This trend will be reversed in the 2025 year.

The Club is the Hub programme funded by the Auckland Cricket Association continues to be a sound initiative as it supports the provision of administrative support to the members and the attendance to a range of compliance matters.

I would also like to take this opportunity to thank our sponsors New World, Victoria Park, Cricket Express, Auckland Cricket, Behemoth, Kookaburra and AVS Air Systems. Their support greatly assists us to foster and grow the game of cricket in Auckland.

The accounting and administration processes once again worked well during the year. The club's compliance costs remain low.

Grafton United remains on a secure financial footing and will be able to withstand any significant environmental changes and the Board is committed maintaining this security.

TEAM CAPTAIN SEASON REPORTS

PREMIER MEN'S CAPTAINS REPORT

After a vastly different and incredibly enjoyable pre-season the Grafton Premier Men began their hunt for silverware with an initial six-week block of two-day cricket. First up was a trip out south to play recently relegated Papatoetoe for what would be a great measuring stick for our title aspirations. After losing the toss and being asked to bowl we hit the ground running and put in a dominant display. A maiden Premier five wicket haul from Nikheil Bhana (5-25) saw us dismantle Papatoetoe for 104 a total which we chased with ease on the back of a maiden Grafton Premier centuries for Jeremy Houghton (100*) and Taine Bayly (105*) at better than a run a ball, the partnership worth over 200 runs. This gave us a significant lead which was insurmountable for the southerners, who we beat by an innings and 74 runs - Taine Bayly the chief destroyer with (6-37). Our next outing, a return to home to play Ellerslie, saw us win the toss and bowl - wickets were shared amongst the bowlers before we found ourselves in significant trouble six down with the score showing 81 in pursuit of 184. This provided a chance for our youngest player Jack Duffy to steal the show, securing us first innings points on the back of some significant contributions from our lower order, our young wicketkeeper stole the show with a classy 95 to steal victory from the jaws of defeat. A washout in the first day of our final pre-Christmas two-day fixture saw the second day played as a one-day match using a red ball. Sineth Gunawardene made a patient 88 while wickets fell at the other end setting Waitakere 268 to chase. This proved to be more than enough as Nikheil Bhana took (6-13) blowing Waitakere off the park for 108.

The middle of the season in the Premier grade is dedicated to the white ball campaigns. The highlight of this portion of the season was the one-day Richard Jones Championship. First up we travelled to Ellerslie, fifties from Jack Duffy (80) and Alex Edwards (57) gave us 260 to defend - newly appointed one-day Captain Dylan Taylor spun us to victory with (4-30). Next up was Papatoetoe at home where we were asked to bowl on a good Victoria Park track - wickets were shared as we managed to bowl the visitors out for 179 before Taine Bayly (83*) and Jack Duffy (52*) saw us home by six wickets. Our next game was at home against Kumeu, turned out to be one for the record books. A 231-opening stand between Taine Bayly (120) and a maiden Premier century from skipper Dylan Taylor (102) saw us pile on 345. The task too much for Kumeu, as Taine Bayly capped of a fantastic day with 4-36. Our first hiccup of the campaign saw us travel to Birkenhead, we fought hard for 196 before losing in the final over by one wicket. The fifth round saw us host Hibiscus Coast (eventual champions). We won the toss and bowled Hibiscus out for 174 - unfortunately we made tough work of it collapsing to 20-4 before a 130-run stand between Alex Edwards (86) and Jack Duffy (49*) got us over the line. Our next game saw us travel to play competition favourites Eden Roskill in what was a rain affected 39 over affair. We lost the toss and only mustered 176 in bowler friendly conditions. Roskill were cruising in pursuit at 116-4 before a monumental collapse saw us bundle the hosts out for 168, 9 runs short of victory. This win secured our side a home semi-final with one round still to play. We closed out the round robin with a dominant win against Waitakere at home. Scoring 214 on the back of Kyle Ruffell's well made (5) in a rain affected 39 over fixture we bundled the westerners out for 147, with wickets once again shared.

We hosted Birkenhead in the Semi-Final - on a flat Victoria Park wicket we managed to bowl the opposition out for 218 which we thought was well below par. A thought that was well justified when we raced out to 173-3 on the back of twin fifties from our experienced middle order pairing of Kyle Ruffell (50) and Sineth Gunawardene (51). However, funny things happen in cricket with the added pressure of finals. Sadly, our men lost 7-37 falling 6 runs short with the penultimate ball being caught on the long-on boundary to end our campaign. A massive learning experience for our young group which we are positive we will correct in the 2024-25 season. In amongst this the boys placed 4th in our T20 pool - some highlights included Jack Duffy's scores of (53* off 26) and (48* off 18), Dylan Taylor's (43 off 24) and (52 off 47) and Fraser Campbell's maiden Premier men five-wicket haul (6-16).



After Christmas and back into two-day cricket, we headed out west to play Kumeu. A five-wicket haul from Taine Bayly (5-69) followed by twin fifties from Sineth Gunawardene and Jack Duffy got us first innings points before a brave spell of on a flat wicket by Fraser Campbell (4-31) left us 175 to chase late on day two. Another classy performance from Sineth (66*) steadied the ship and saw us take home maximum points. On the back of a painful loss to Birkenhead in the one-day semi-final, round 5 in the two-day grade gave our squad a shot at redemption against Birkenhead. Losing the toss and being put into bat Dylan Taylor made batting look easy and piled on (126) at better than a run a ball, his second century of the season setting Birkenhead 253 for victory. Hard toil on a pitch which became incredibly favourable for batting, we secured first innings points with the attack sharing the wickets. A sporting declaration with a lead of 170 gave the visitors a sniff at outright in around 45 overs. As captain I must say I was feeling very nervous about the decision when Birkenhead raced out to 66-1 but as the story went for most of the season Taine Bayly (5-38) spun us to victory with an incredible spell. This left us sitting pretty with a 20-point lead going into the final two rounds. Our penultimate game against Howick Pakuranga, the boys from out east wiped us off the park as we conceded first innings points. Outright points were saved by youngster Garth Olliff (65*), which come seasons end would become a pivotal performance in our campaign. Our final fixture of the season saw us travel to Hibiscus Coast to play the one-day title winners. Rain effected much of this match and after being put into bat on a green, wet pitch, the boys were reeling at 95-5. Thankfully coach and captain, Raja Sandhu (90) and Alex Edwards (67) combined to get a respectable 271. As previously mentioned much of this game and others were rain affected and with the standings only having a few points in it, the side badly needed first innings points to claim the Tom Hellaby. Ten minutes before the heavens opened for the final time of the season the Grafton boys pulled off first innings points on the back of a herculean 6-21) in 23 overs by Auckland Premier Club Cricketer of the Year - Taine Bayly and thus won promotion into the Hedley Howarth for 2024/25.

WOMEN'S PREMIER RESERVE REPORT

Season 2023/24 saw Grafton's long awaited return to senior women's cricket.

The club has a proud recent history of women's cricket, first appearing in 1992/93 and winning Premier titles and Hearts/White Ferns call ups across the 90's and early 2000's.

This year we entered a Premier Reserve team mostly made up mostly from last season's championship-winning Under 16 team. The nucleus of this team had been together as Under 11s at the club, and the team is still very young - the squad were all aged between 14 and 20 years old.

We entered the Reserves Tier Two T20 competition pre-Xmas, looking to find where our level was and to build confidence for the longer format in 2024. And confidence was certainly built, with a great run to the Final on 16 December against hosts Parnell at Thomas Bloodworth Park.

The team played superbly well in the Final, dominating from the start and securing our first title in our first season back.

3RD GRADE CAPTAIN'S REPORT

The Thirds found themselves in unfamiliar territory this year - normally in the mix for top position, they were instead fighting to avoid the wooden spoon.

We saved our best performances for December-January before the wheels fell off ending the season seventh overall.

In the two-day format, we secured only one first innings win, and lost outright three times - a rare occurrence for us in the longer format. There were brighter spots in the Tyler Haslemore captained one-day campaign - four wins and three losses.

There were several gutsy performances throughout the season that we can be proud of including a one-day victory over eventual champions Cornwall.

Our season MVP and top wicket taker was Abby Sharma, winning the 3rd Team Player of the Year cup kindly donated by Nicholas Albrecht. The energetic bowling all-rounder took 31 wickets at 12.45 including two 5'fas and made 182 handy runs with a best of 68.

For the second season in a row, our top run scorer was Ryan Thakur. As well as helping Auckland to a championship at the Over 40s Nationals, Ryan scored three fifties and our only century (103*). He made 421 runs at 32.38 to go along with 13 wickets.

Into the season, we got a rude awakening at Walker Park - being put in on a green seamer and bowled out for just 25 in under the hour against Parnell. It wasn't all one-way traffic, with Grafton taking Parnell's ten wickets for 69 in 20 overs (Bird, 5/12) and then amassing 237 (Thakur, 50; Haslemore, 45; Das, 44). Parnell chased 194 for the outright. Showing a high degree of ring rust, there were 13 ducks in the match.

First winning points followed in an absorbing affair on an Eastdale artificial against Suburbs Thirds. Ryan Thakur and Abby Sharma got twin 68s in Grafton's 223. Sharma followed this up with 5/26 (12) to help secure a 35-run lead and first innings points.

Thakur was the only Grafton batter to reach double figures in the second innings, with 89 (70) allowing Grafton to declare on 139/9 (30). Suburbs target was 175 in 22 overs. Regular wickets saw us on top, until a masterful 51 (31) by soon-to-be mid-season transfer Abdullah Bangi gave Suburbs hope. When he got out with six runs required off 10 balls, the balanced tipped back to Grafton. With six required off the last over it came down to the last ball (4 W . . . 2). Suburbs taking the reverse outright to stun Grafton and possibly sum up the season.

Rain meant the next fixture was converted to a one-dayer against University. An indifferent fielding performance with multiple catches going down saw Grafton chasing 257 and coming up well short with 136 all out. The only bright spots were Pratik Dabir's 2 wickets and Abdullah Bangi's 61 not out on debut.

Going into the one-dayer comp proper, Grafton faced rivals and competition leaders Cornwall on Victoria Park 1. Cornwall got off to a flyer, on 51 in the eighth over before losing their first wicket. The Thirds bowlers and fielders rallied to screw down the run rate and take regular wickets - Manpreet Singh Bonss with 4/18 (5) and Peter Stamp with 3/31 (8). Grafton faced a chase of 142 and got off to a good start with Ali Millwala (13) and captain Haslemore (28) combining for a partnership of 45. Things got ropey in the middle, before Nick Gavigan (25) and super sub Ross Deans (26*) steadied the ship. Deans getting the job done with an audacious four in the 37th over with Grafton 8 down. A season highlight.

Grafton then strangled the Suburbs Phantoms at Cox's Bay, bowling the visitors out for 101 in 30.2 overs with Abby Sharma starring with the ball - 4/24 (8). The batters then got a handful of starts to help us to a four wicket win in the 27th over.

A similar low scoring affair followed at Kumeū. Back from his OE, Isaac Hocking-Whitehead took 3/23 and returnee Lahiru (Leo) Madusanka took 4/38. Helped by an Millwala 32, Thirds chased the 102 with three wickets to spare.



The wickets were shared around in a win against Howick on Vic 3 as we were set 161. All our batters got starts into double figures (Thakur, 46*; Das, 35*; Haslemore, 34) and confidently chased the target in 28 overs with eight wickets in hand.

A 92 run fourth wicket partnership for Parnell turned the match at Cox's Bay, the visitors making 172/9 (40). Three scores in the 20s were never enough to make a strong chase, with Grafton going down by 48 runs.

Back at Vic 1, Ryan Thakur's 103* (83 balls including 8 fours and 3 sixes) was the shining light in Grafton's rain affected 153/3 (30) against Suburbs Thirds. Suburbs getting the win by four wickets.

University heaped on the pain in a nine wicket win chasing 162, although it was great to see Hamish Reid top score for Grafton with a well complied 38.

Back into the two-dayers, Cornwall was out for revenge. Grafton's timid 59 all out and then 59/4 to close day one meant it was mostly uphill to One Tree Hill. The main highlight was Abby Sharma's post lunch spell, with 5/29 (12) showing he's amongst the best in the grade. A short day two saw Grafton get ten runs in front and then Cornwall take the ten wicket outright. Back to the drawing board.

A first innings and outright loss followed to Suburbs Phantoms at Eastdale, with a lack of runs a reoccurring theme - Grafton making 118 and 132 meaning the Phantoms only required two overs in their second innings.

Grafton got back into the grind at Victoria Park 3 against Kumeū. A 60 run opening stand between Praveen Kumar (39) and Haslemore (36) got us off to a promising start. Eight single figure scores followed to see us bundled out for 115. The wickets were shared around and Kumeū made the strange decision to declare just 19 runs ahead and seven wickets down.

A sparkling 51* (47) by Madusanka to end day one was continued on day two by Nick Gavigan (37) for a combined 88. Yours truly as the nightwatchmen also stuck around - batting for nearly four hours and 211 balls to make 75. Joined by a Thakur 29 and Millwala 40* meant Grafton took the lead to 260 in dusty turning conditions. A tired and frustrated Kumeū briefly had a go at the chase making 105/3 (19) before there were handshakes at 6pm.

After the hard-fought draw, the final round of the season loomed against Howick. It was a damp one, with a delayed start and then a solid bowling performance seeking Howick all out for 154. Grafton's 17/0 off two overs was to be the final act for the Thirds season - day two completely rained out.

No doubt lessons will be taken from the tough season and the Thirds will be back and firing on all cylinders in 2024-25. Despite some tough times, it's awesome to see the talent growing their game in third grade, taking a bigger part in our victories and often going onto show their skills in higher grades.

Special thanks for the season go to my co-captain Tyler Haslemore, club captains Nick Gavigan and Kyle Ruffell, coaches Thushan Dodampegamage and Raja Sandu, plus Will's Reserves side and Ravi's Fourths side - in a long season, the strength and support of the squad makes the difference. Thanks also to Phil Dunn and Tayna Reynolds keeping things humming around the grounds.

PREMIER GRADE RECORDS

Formed in September 1862 as Auckland United, the club changed its name to United to avoid confusion with the Auckland Club, which also played in the Senior Grade at the time. The proper Auckland club competition began in 1885/86, and United were one of the original teams. In 1903/04 the format was changed to one based on the district where the players resided, and the name was changed to Grafton. Although the district scheme did not last, the name remained, but with United added back to the title (although the club is still generally referred to simply as "Grafton"). It has remained as such for over 100 years, except for 1952/53 to 1954/55 when renamed Metropolitan, although the colours have changed to black and gold. **Grafton United is the only club in Auckland which has played every year in the premier competition.**

These archival records are compiled from all the material and sources currently available to the club and cover the period from 1882/83 to date. **They are by no means definitive** and if anyone can assist in any way, contact the club. This grade has also been known by other names in the past, notably Senior and District.

The + sign beside many totals indicates that not all relevant details are known (e.g. for seasons where only short scoreboards were published in newspapers, the player will have scored more runs than shown here).

In addition, NCC denotes National Club Championships and LS denotes Lloyd Seabrook Trophy.
