## CLUB CHAIR'S REPORT

Dear Grafton United members,

I welcome the opportunity to present my fourth chair's report and 161st of the Grafton United Cricket Club.

It would have been a surprising forecast to say we would face a more disrupted season than during Covid times, but there you go. 'Weather affected' was a common term in season 22/23. Luckily, we fared better than some and our members made the most of the cricketing opportunities when the sun was out.

### 160th Anniversary

The club hosted a get together on 26 November 2022 to celebrate our 160th anniversary. The Grafton United community turned out in a full clubrooms. An important goal of the evening was staying connected to the pride of Grafton United lions and lionesses. It was great to see lifelong friendships and memories still strong. Reconnecting with Adrian Smith over from the UK and players from the last 50 years was a real thrill. More than a few stories were exchanged.

My thanks to everyone who joined us, and special thanks to our MC Richard Irving; speakers Mark Burgess, Phil Horne, Ajay Mistry, Nikheil Bhana; organisers Stew Wilson, Ross Deans, Phil Dunn and Tanya Reynolds; and Chris McQuaid for updating our Premier career statistics for the anniversary. Many thanks to those who donated to support initiatives we are undertaking to help position the club for the future.

### Overview

During the 2022/23 season, Grafton United enabled 3,512 Aucklanders to experience the social and physical benefits of cricket. Your club stands proudly within the Auckland and New Zealand cricket communities.

Our senior numbers had a slight decline with some independent teams struggling for numbers as well deserved overseas travel was taken, meaning we had 15 teams. The GUCC junior club saw over 481 junior members participant in cricket. This season saw the welcome return of school programmes with 25 visits to 11 schools helping thousands more Aucklanders to experience cricket.

Severe weather events, particularly the Auckland anniversary floods and Cyclone Gabrielle, made for a disrupted season. As a small mercy, many of the cancellations occurred while juniors were on holiday.

Victoria Park didn't just suffer due to weather – a large scale concert resulted in significant damage to the ground in January. We worked proactively with the Waitemata Local Board, Auckland Council and Auckland Cricket to highlight the impact, resulting in another scheduled concert getting shifted off Victoria Park.

Along with the 160th anniversary, the return of our mainstay events – the Super Sixes – and introduction of new One Club days were real standouts this season.

### Playing

It was really up and down season with some highs like the return of Super Sixes and the two-day format and lows like a diabolical amount of rain impacting multiple playing days.

Congratulations to the five senior teams who brought home championships - Friends XI, Fourths, Tigers, Beige Brigade and The Shockers. A number of other sides were also in the hunt through the season, notably the second place Premier two-day side.

Well done to those who reached big milestones or higher honours -

The Premiers added two new baggy cap wearers:

Three Grafton players - Ben Brady, Fraser Campbell and Will Martin -represented Tāmaki Makaurau in the inaugural Māori Nationals competition in Whangarei at Easter. They won the tournament, with Ben and Fraser making the tournament team.

Ben Handy from our presidents side also represented Auckland, in the over 50s. And Vishal Dube of Friends XI represented NZ in the over 40s against Australia, where he was equal top wicket taker.

This season saw the arrival of Play HQ, replacing CricHQ as New Zealand’s community scoring system. This wasn’t without its technical issues and functional limitations. Thank you to our team, volunteers and members for their support and understanding during this period. Clubs and major associations have set clear expectations on PlayHQ improvements together with NZC for the coming season.

Our junior committee, coordinators, coaches and managers did an amazing job to provide cricket for our younger members. Thank you all. You can read more about the season in Garrick Sutherland’s junior chair report and our coordinators other reports in this booklet.

### Governance

I am grateful for the guidance and support of an experienced board, both in and out of cricket.

You are well served by your board, with each board member having oversight of a key area - Stewart Wilson (President, Trust and clubrooms); Mark Bird (Chair, ACA, staffing); Peter Meads (Hon Treasurer, finance); Mike Currie (Hon Secretary, fundraising); Alastair Lee (judiciary and sponsorship); Brent McAnulty (Girls cricket and EDCA); Martin Webster (grants); Bridget Smith (juniors and one club); Hiren Patel (Indo-Kiwi and seniors); Ross Deans (seniors); and Glenn Horne (grounds and facilities)

An addition to the board was Bridget Smith, picking up the junior portfolio from Brent McAnulty. This is part of our aim to represent our membership with a variety of perspectives. Alongside Bridget, Garrick Sutherland joined as Junior Chair.

I would like to thank retiring board member Brent McAnulty for his significant contribution particularly in the junior space. I have appreciated Brent’s wise counsel. It’s wonderful that he will continue to contribute to Grafton’s female cricket initiatives.

### Finance

As you will see later in this report, the club made a surplus of \$22,665 in part a result of junior fundraising and coaching programmes, and corporate cricket days. My thanks to Honourable Treasurer Peter Meads for his continued oversight in this area of the club.

We continue to focus investment in coaching which provides our players with opportunities to develop their skills. We are investing last season’s surplus directly back into our indoor school to provide a better member experience. Unlocking grant funding to support this type of investment remains an opportunity area for the club.

On behalf of the club, I would like to thank Auckland Cricket for their ongoing support of the community game through the Club is the Hub programme. Following a review which we took an active part in, a remodelled approach commences this coming season.

### Grounds and Facilities

The board actively engages with Auckland Council and the Waitematā Local Board over Victoria Park, the clubrooms and Cox’s Bay. This has been a key focus, particularly as the Victoria Park Sports and Cultural Trust (VSP&CT) work towards a clubrooms lease renewal on our behalf.

We continue to take a stewardship position and work proactively to highlight the needs of our club, organised sports and recreation for the local community.

Early in the season, Auckland Council completed repairs and replacement of our clubroom and indoor school roofs. While this resulted in some pre-season disruption, it helped ensure we got through the severe weather that followed.



It was a particularly active season that saw us go into bat multiple times on your behalf. With our ongoing position that Victoria Park's primary purpose is sport and recreation, we objected to two intensive concerts and escalated our concerns to the Local Board.

The commercial music event Plane Sailing took place in January 2023. We objected to this event and escalated to the Waitemata Local Board. The sports fields suffered significant damage, preventing matches for the remainder of January. This was heart-breaking for our members, and exactly the reason we raised concerns prior to the event.

Working alongside Community Facilities and Auckland Cricket, we insisted Victoria Park not be used for the scheduled Gardens Music Festival later that month. We were successful in this request, with the festival shifting to the Domain, then Spark Arena as flooding hit Auckland. The widespread flooding saw Victoria Park under nearly a metre of water.

We thank the Auckland Council and Waitemata Local Board for funding and work to replace the roof and beginning to address concerns about intensive commercial events. Thank you also to VPS&CT chair, Nicholas Albrecht for his wise counsel and support.

Looking ahead, as part of our strategy to provide fit for purpose facilities we are investing in our indoor school. The club has made a commitment to progress the net upgrade as soon as possible. We want a facility that we're all proud of, is safer, and gets better utilisation across the community. Stage 1 includes net replacement and net rails re-engineering, and a modern booking system.

#### **Club Management**

Alongside Phil Dunn and Tanya Reynolds in the office, the team was joined by new junior coach Will Martin. It is great to have a senior player involved in developing the cricketing potential of our young members.

As you will see later in this report, Phil developed and executed a business plan aligned to our strategic plan, with particular highlights being a strong junior programme and One Club initiative that seeks to engage our members at Cox's Bay.

I want to acknowledge and give a big thanks to Phil, Tanya, Will and the team for their tireless contribution to Grafton United.

#### **Thank you**

On behalf of the club I want to thank everyone who has played, coached, captained, scored, umpired, organised and supported. A special thanks to our board, committees and volunteers who shared their Grafton spirit, time and skills with the club.

Grafton United remains grateful to our sponsors and funders. Thank you to Steve and New World Victoria Park team, and Jarrod and the Cricket Express team, and all our other club sponsors - you will find details of them in this annual report. I ask members to support these local businesses who support us.

## SENIOR CLUB CAPTAIN'S REPORT

### 3rd and 4th XI - Club Captain Report by Nick Gavigan

The 22/23 season was a success in many aspects. Obviously results were very pleasing with 4th XI winning the 6th grade championship on the back of some outstanding wins in the two-day games. The 3rd XI finished narrowly second to Cornwall in the 3rd grade, despite winning the two-day competition. More satisfying than the results has been the collective pride as a squad, the growth and cohesion as team units, and the strength of community culture which has been a focus for our group for a few seasons. Off the field, the squad culture has developed very well and the sense of community in the group is palpable by the vibrant buzz at the weekly training sessions and the enthusiastic attendance at after-match "drinks" - win, lose or draw.

For the 4th XI the season represents a truly awesome resurgence after suffering relegation in two consecutive seasons prior. For the 3rd XI it was business as usual, continuing its Canterbury Crusaders-esque record in third grade in the last 10 years.

For the past two seasons the main objective in our 3rd and 4th XI squad has been to develop a strong community and culture - with an emphasis developing good values, upholding standards of behaviour and respect, and, most importantly, valuing all members. Although we don't regard game performances and results as the most important indicators of the squad's achievement, winning becomes a byproduct of establishing a strong culture. And there's no doubt that we love winning.

As alluded to above, the 3rd XI has been dominant for some time now, and under Mark Bird's strong leadership the team has largely looked after itself. The 22/23 season was very enjoyable (I am a member of the team) and we were able to consistently name a similar 11 each week which allowed us to develop strongly as a team. Special mention goes to Peter Stamp, who was unable to play most of the season due to recovery from concussion, but who has become a very popular and outspoken member of the squad with his attendance almost every week at training running in hard and bowling for hours. Peter wears his heart on his sleeve which is very valuable in influencing others in the squad and his compassion is terrific. I will leave it to Mark Bird's report as captain of 3rd XI to go into more detail on the team's season. I will now turn focus to the 4th XI which is the 'engine room' and foundation of the senior club.

Developing the 4th XI has been my primary focus as club captain. In response to the 4th XI's torrid season in 20/21 which ended in relegation from fourth grade, we began to focus on our culture and the development of our community. This was not in response to losing, but rather it was because we were concerned that there was a lack of community spirit and sense of team. It's possible to lose games and still carry oneself with dignity and camaraderie, however this was absent from the 4th XI leadership, and gradually the team began to resemble a collection of individuals rather than a united group. Above all else, we were doing our players a disservice by not providing an environment in which cricket could always be enjoyed in the spirit of good sport.

So we established some values and standards, including: accountability of all players to basic standards (such as on field behaviour, arriving on time etc); participation and commitment to the squad were emphasized and were galvanized as selection criteria; every player was valued and a squad rule was established that each player is to have a defined role in each game (i.e. if you are a batter you bat in the top 6; if you are a bowler you get overs) and a fair chance to fulfil that role in the game; encouraging compassion at all times on the field, especially when things weren't going well; ensuring that we as club leaders are always 'on the ground' with our players in games and in training to ensure we can communicate and share our players experiences, to let their voices be heard; ensuring we understood each players goals and intentions with their cricket so we can facilitate them as best we can; ensuring new players are warmly welcomed and are fully informed of our values and how our squad works; ensuring all players find a home in the squad; celebrating and rewarding performances, efforts and improvements; giving all members transparency on selections and establishing the key criteria considered for



promoting players - with emphasis on character and attitude. Underpinning all of this, our principle is that we show our players that we care for them and in return we expect that they will give their very best for our squad.

There were also some initiatives established which helped us become a tight-knit community: we started a squad WhatsApp group - for practical purposes to facilitate immediate coms - and for social purposes to provide a fun platform for honest discussion available to every member (many highs and lows have been enjoyed in there!); we hosted a preseason bowling night to get the crew together and reinforce relationships during the winter.

The benefits of our cultural emphasis were not obvious to everyone on the surface - the 21/22 season ended again in relegation for the 4th XI. But underneath there were many positives to take away. The culture was clearly much better, and we had begun to develop a solid base of players who had bought into the positive values and direction. This was reflected in our net gain of players between seasons. Indeed many of the players in the squad continued training and social games during the winter, reflecting enjoyment of each other's company, demonstrating hunger for success, and simply showing joy in the game.

The way in which things fell into place for 4th XI in the 22/23 season flowed on from this. Particular credit goes to Ravi Pal who took up captaincy of 4th XI and drove the team forward especially with his service off the field. Ravi made plans and set about driving the team to success from early in pre-season; and made it clear his determination that 4th XI would win the 6th grade. It was clear from early in the season that 4th XI had become a real team unit - greater than the sum of its parts. Squad depth had become strong and skill levels trending upward. This began to show in performances with some cracking wins, built off individual performances from many different players demonstrating resilience and will to win. The performance described below vs Birkenhead was a tipping point for the team, after which there was a very strong belief that a championship was theirs for the taking. A huge congratulations to the team for its achievement and we look forward to more. A huge thank you to Phil Dunn for his continued excellence as manager, and an even bigger thank you to Mark Bird for his governance of the club and of our squad, and who is in every sense a great man.

## Two particular 4th XI games stand out and deserve mention:

1. Before Christmas break 4th XI vs Birkenhead in a two-dayer on an artificial pitch at Kaipatiki Park. Grafton won the toss and inserted Birkenhead who made a strong 268 all out in 52 overs. Schalk Wasserman 77\*(66). Rohan Jangam 4-42 off 13 overs. At stumps on day 1 Grafton was on life-support having lost its first 5 batters and only putting 53 on the board. In arrears by 215 Abhi Solanki (98) resumed day 2 at the crease and was soon joined by Bhaskar "King" Reddy (70). The pair put on a brave match-winning partnership, taking the team very close, with captain Ravi and the tailenders scoring the 30-odd remaining runs promptly to get the lads to a first innings lead of 2 runs, just getting there before the maximum 60 overs surpassed. A truly massive achievement. There were only approx. 60 overs remaining in the day for the 2nd innings shoot out. No problem for Grafton, which promptly rolled Birkenhead for 47 in 24 overs. Wickets shared. Grafton needed only 37 balls to knock off the total only 2 wickets down.

2. Early March 4th XI vs Suburbs New Lynn in a two-dayer on grass at Cox's Bay. Grafton won the toss and inserted SNL who made 191 all out in 55 overs. At the end of day 1 Grafton were 6 down and still over 100 runs behind with Shaan Vaidya and Ravi Pal at the crease. Showing real grit Shaan scored 80 and Ravi 51 to take Grafton to 231/9-d. And true to the form shown against Birkenhead, Grafton completed the job by rolling SNL for 85 in 35 overs - Rohan again with 4 wickets - and chasing the required 45 in 50 balls for a win by 9 wickets.

## JUNIOR CHAIR'S REPORT

It is with immense pleasure that I present the season report for our Junior Club's 2022/23 season. Once again, we witnessed a strong and successful season for our junior cricketers.

This season, we were thrilled to have over 450 registered players, forming a total of 51 teams within our junior club. Additionally, we facilitated 48 cricketers who represented Waiheke Island under the administration of Grafton. It is encouraging to note that our numbers have increased compared to last year, particularly among our youngest players in the Year 1-2 Grade, indicating significant growth.

Despite the challenges posed by the pandemic in recent seasons, the changes implemented to enhance participation have been well integrated into our club's structure. Our youngest members begin their journey by learning the basics in our Cub program on Thursday evenings at Cox's Bay. They then progress through our Saturday morning softball grades. Starting from Year 5 (Under 10), our teams transition to hard ball cricket and engage in matches against clubs outside our district. At the Under 12 level, our players have the opportunity to experience afternoon cricket, playing extended 30-over matches. Girls' cricket typically starts in the mixed junior grades and migrates to school or friendship-based teams in the Under 11s competition and then progresses to Under 13s and Under 16s Auckland Cricket competitions.

Our Sunday cricket program includes composite age group teams that compete in the JT Sparling Super Series against Parnell, University, Cornwall, and Howick Pakuranga. Our Under 10 Gold team, in particular, has achieved great success going unbeaten and winning the U10s. Looking ahead to the next season, we aim to cultivate a performance mindset and approach, fostering the participation and skill development of these enthusiastic cricketers.

One of the season's most memorable events was the long-awaited return of the Super Sixes tournament, an annual fixture that had been impacted by COVID. It was a true highlight for our junior club to come together again after missing out on the past two seasons. This enjoyable day wouldn't have been possible without the passion of those involved, especially the Junior Committee, and our generous sponsors. The purpose of the tournament was to have fun, with teams selected randomly, providing everyone a chance to mingle and meet new people. Under clear blue skies, everyone had a fantastic day, and we managed to raise \$6,200 for the junior club. We extend our heartfelt gratitude to all those who participated.

This year, we held our prize-giving ceremony in the evening after the final day's play at Cox's Bay. We were fortunate to have good weather on Friday, March 24, and the Pavilion steps provided a fitting stage to honour players who had excelled in their teams. Congratulations to the raffle winners, and we express our gratitude to our sponsors.

We must highlight the remarkable progress of girls' cricket, as we added another team this year, bringing the total to four. Our Under 16 team deserves special recognition for winning their Championship. The Thursday evening Blitz competition at Cox's Bay also showcased great competitiveness and enjoyment among the girls.

In January, several of our teams represented the club at the Hawkes Bay cricket camps. This invaluable experience allowed our cricketers to learn new skills on grass wickets in a tour environment. I highly recommend this experience to any passionate cricketer.

I would like to express my sincere appreciation to the Junior Committee for their unwavering dedication and energy, particularly in a year filled with uncertainty regarding season dates and conditions. ## CLUB MANAGER'S REPORT

It was with a sense of trepidation we approached the 2022/23 season. We were mindful that over the last two seasons our ability to seamlessly delivery cricket has been dramatically affected by COVID-19. We had declining junior registrations, declining senior teams and had made losses in each of the preceding two years. Grafton was turning 160, the club was wrapped in scaffolding and the council was planning a series of summer dance parties at Victoria Park. There was reasonable cause for concern.

We set out our approach in planning for the season based on following:

- The framework provide by our updated Strategic Plan - considerable time has been spent with the board updating our Strategic Plan (cheers for those Zoom calls Alastair Lee)
- Our 160<sup>th</sup> anniversary - 160 years is certainly not achieved through good luck, but through a robust and mature focus on the past, the present and the future. It speaks of a rich and proud history alongside a long-term approach to providing cricket within our community.
- We took time to look at our past, to see what has made Grafton successful.
- Made observations from other cricket and sports clubs.
- Awareness and eagerness to move on from the COVID years.

### Pre-season engagement

For the last couple of years both summer and winter sports had been dramatically affected by COVID-19. We set about growing our registrations by targeting the following:

#### Junior registration growth

Our local school keenly opened their doors to our coaches and we managed to run 151 school engagement sessions across 11 schools reaching over 3,000 year 1-4 children. So apart from blowing the printing budget on registration flyers for the kids we grew our cubs and junior registrations back to numbers not seen for a few years.

#### Pre-season training

With the club and indoor nets were wrapped in scaffolding and safety netting we partnered with Garry Wood at St Peter College to offer a series of age and stage specific six week training programmes in the new SPC indoor nets.

#### Senior team indoor net bookings

This one didn't work out so well, Raja and Thush managed to keep the prems and reserves seniors training under the safety netting but with the power and lighting issues we encountered, it really wasn't an environment to encourage members into.

### Challenges

#### Changes at Auckland Cricket and NZ Cricket

There was some key personnel changes at Auckland Cricket, and this unfortunately coincided with NZ Cricket making the strategic switch from CricHQ to an Australian multisport application called PlayHQ for registrations, online scoring and player statistics. This resulted in a new team working on a new system making all past procedure and processes redundant. PlayHQ wasn't ready either, resulting in an exponential increase setup and administration for Auckland Cricket and this mirrored across the club network. With the season fast approaching we began training users on a system that was for the most part only partly functional. To be honest, though we can now see a way forward, the PlayHQ journey was difficult and not one I'd wish on others.



### Concerts and Events at Victoria Park and Cox's Bay

We undoubtedly have an ongoing challenge around the Auckland Council approved concerts and events scheduled during the cricket season. Part of being in the central city means our venues are also prime venues for other events. We work as closely as possible with Auckland Council to ensure Victoria Park remains a sport venue as identified in their Victoria Park Management Plan. Nevertheless, we had a few events thrown at us this summer.

### Plane Sailing Drum & Bass at Victoria Park

This the second year this event has been scheduled on the January opening weekend. This year was an absolute trainwreck. The fields were damaged during the event and trashed during the pack down taking wickets offline for a few weeks and the Presidents wicket (#5) for the remainder of the season

### Oempa Festival at Cox's Bay

Now this was a classic, we didn't even know this was on until they delivered port-a-loos and started fencing off part of Cox's Bay. In the end I got hold of the event organiser and between us we found a way of minimising the disruption to cricket for our members.

### Fatboy Slim at Victoria Park

This was another gem of an event scheduled in-season that we managed, with assistance from Local Board and the sports teams at Auckland Council, to get moved to Auckland Domain. Unfortunately this then took the Domain out of action for weeks while these grounds recovered pushing more games to unfavourable venues like Avondale Racecourse.

### Rain and Cancellations

Now we managed to get all but one weekend of our Saturday morning junior cricket this season, but senior afternoon cricket was terribly affected by the weather. For example, the premis had 7 games abandoned, and many other affected by the atrocious weather.

## Registrations

We managed to grow our cubs and year 1 and 2 numbers and even added teams in some of the older junior and grades. On the senior side we lost 2 one-day teams but managed to add a new T20 team.



## TREASURER'S REPORT

### GRAFTON UNITED CRICKET CLUB (INC.)

#### TREASURER'S REPORT For the Twelve Months Ended 30 April 2023

I am pleased to present the financial reports of the Grafton United Cricket Club (Inc.) for the year ended 30 April 2023. It should be noted that at the time of preparing the annual report the annual review had not been signed off.

The enclosed financial statements show that the club generated a profit for the year of \$22,665.

It should be noted that there is a loan from the Eastern Districts Cricket Association of \$25,000. This is being treated as a liability in the accounts. The loan may convert to income a later date but as at Balance Date we had not meet all of the conditions of the loan to allow conversion to income.

Our budget for the 2024 year has been finalised and we are forecasting a profit of around \$3,000. The ACA has confirmed that our grant for the 2024 year will be slightly less than the grant we received in the 2023 year.

Our cash position increased during the financial year by \$6,630 (2022 decrease, \$9,627).

The Club is the Hub programme funded by the Auckland Cricket Association continues to be a sound initiative as it supports the provision of administrative support to the members and the attendance to a range of compliance matters.

I would also like to take this opportunity to thank our sponsors New World, Victoria Park and Cricket Express. Their support greatly assists us to foster and grow the game of cricket in Auckland.

The accounting and administration processes once again worked well during the year. The club's compliance costs remain low.

Grafton United remains on a secure financial footing and will be able to withstand any significant environmental changes and the Board is committed maintaining this security.

## 3<sup>RD</sup> GRADE CAPTAIN'S REPORT

Thirds were looking to continue our consistent strong performances, going into this season with five titles and three top three places in the past eight seasons.

While another title alluded us, the team once again proudly represented Grafton United, finishing second overall behind rivals Cornwall. An abridged one-day section, with a 1-2 record landing us sixth. This was offset by a 5-1 record in the two-dayers, including two outright victories, that positioned us first on that table.

Our season MVP was Hanshul Singhania, winning the 3rd Team Player of the Year cup kindly donated by Nicholas Albrecht. The gloveman recorded 14 stumpings (including some off the medium pacers) and also made 134 handy runs at 22 with a high of 57\*.

Isaac Hocking-Whitehead was our top wicket taker, having shared the title with Pero Garlick two seasons prior. Isaac's pace and aggression saw him take 22 wickets at 17 with a best of 4-16.

Our top run scorer was Ryan Thakur. Ryan's consistency was stand out, scoring four fifties including a top score of 92. He made 323 runs at 40.4 to go along with 12 wickets.

Into the season, we got a rude awakening at Cornwall Park – the same ground we'd won the final a few months earlier. Day one saw us chase leather on the small number 3, with Cornwall amassing 323 and Anurag Narula's 4'fa the only bright spot. At 8/3, our reply got off to an average start. Heading into day two, Kushal Das went from 17\* overnight to a match saving 51. Grafton was 108/8...

...And then it rained – Remainder of day two washed out.

This was quickly followed by a welcome outright win against Howick Pakuranga. Howick only mustered 90 with wickets shared around before the Grafton batters went on a tear – Das was again in the runs (75 including 12 fours) alongside Finn Ambridge (49) and day two specialist Tyler Haslemore (37). The wickets again were shared around as Howick was bundled out for 115 with six overs to spare. Grafton took the outright by an innings and 61 runs.

And then it rained – A two-day wash out without a ball bowled against Kumeu.

Heading into the one-dayers, we faced Cornwall again and came out on the wrong side. 20s and 30s with the bat gave us a middling 176 which Cornwall chased down with four wickets in hand. A disappointing outing against the eventual champions.

Hoping for a rinse and repeat against Howick, Ryan Thakur's 3/6 (3) saw the visitors to Victoria Park number 1 restricted to 120. The start of Grafton's innings was marred by the discovery that Howick was using a two-piece ball. This wasn't before opener Nick Gavigan had chipped one to mid-on, allegedly because of the extra swing. Four-piece obtained; Grafton was in early trouble but feeling confident...

...And then it rained – Match abandoned.

Parnell's one-day run rate struggled along on a damp day. With Beauden Barrett watching on, Isaac Hocking-Whitehead took three wickets to have Parnell at 105/6 (31)...

...And then it rained – Match abandoned.

A fired-up Peter Stamp returned from injury against Papatoetoe at Cox's Bay. Confined to the indoor nets for months, the Englishman broke out with 4/13 (7) as Papatoetoe was rolled for 99 in the first match of 2023. Grafton made quick work of the target, with Ryan Thakur (53\* including 4 sixes and 4 fours) and Josh Brazendale (31 off 12 including 3 sixes and 2 fours) helping get the job done in the 16th over.

What turned out to be the last one-dayer of the season proved to be our most disappointing performance (bar a hatrick), possibly the difference between second place and the title. Suburbs Thirds 150 was highlighted by Usman Shah's hatrick – taking the 7th, 8th and 9th wicket on the trot, topped off by a stunning catch behind the



stumps by Bhaskar Reddy. Uzzie also executed a run out for the 10th wicket. In reply, three Grafton batters top scoring with 13 on a slow pitch and an even slower outfield says it all. Rolled for 102 in 33 overs.

And then it rained – Anniversary floods cancelled the Suburbs Phantoms match.

And then it kept raining – Flood impacts cancelled the Kumeu match.

Returning to two-dayers and at the top of that table, we faced Papatoetoe, who in turn faced a Pero Garlick spin bowling master class. The visitors were no match for the now regular reserve player – taking 12 for the match – 7/16 (14.4) and 5/31 (13). Grafton had quickly declared its first innings (Tyler Haslemore 55) and taken 19 Papatoetoe wickets on day one...

...And then it rained - Cyclone Gabrielle completely washed-out day two.

Facing Parnell, Ryan Thakur's 65 was key in Grafton's 165 all out. Isaac Hocking-Whitehead and yours truly combined for four wickets a piece, with Parnell shot out for 68 with two overs remaining on day one. First innings points secured...

...And then it rained – Day two washed out.

Into the last month of the season against Suburbs Thirds, regular reserves players Nic Robinson (3) and Anurag Narula (4) did the damage with the ball to restrict Suburbs to 142. Grafton replied with an aggressive 289 (58) featuring a masterful 92 from Ryan Thakur, 55 from Hanshul Singhania, and 47 from Josh Brazendale. We ran through Suburbs for 74 by another four for Narula and three for Isaac Hocking-Whitehead. Grafton outright by an innings and 73 runs.

And then in rained – Day one washed out against Suburbs Phantoms.

The final match was converted to one-day format. There were still placings to play for, so both teams didn't hold back. Ryan Thakur once again starred with the bat, compiling 61 runs as Grafton made a par 180 all out. The Phantoms came out firing, racing to 50 off 10 overs before a run out by Nick Gavigan and Hanshul Singhania stalled the run rate. Frustrating umpiring decisions focused Grafton's efforts, led by an economical 2/13 (9) from Thakur and 3/36 (8.4) from part-time paceman Fraser Bainbridge eventually seeing Grafton home by 22 runs.

While Cornwall bettered us in the early rounds, it was great to put other performances together throughout the season, getting key results to secure second place. Despite the weather affected season, we used 29 players. Big thanks to the Fourths who came up and Reserves who came down to represent Thirds.

Another great season for Grafton United Thirds, a team I've been proud to captain for the past six seasons. It's awesome to see the young talent growing their game in third grade, taking a bigger part in our victories and often going onto show their skills in higher grades.

Special thanks for the season goes to club captains Nick Gavigan and Ross Deans, coaches Thushan Dodamegamage and Raja Sandu, plus Ben's Reserves side and Ravi's Fourths side - in a long season, the strength and support of the squad makes the difference. Thanks also to Phil Dunn, Tayna Reynolds and groundie Nigel Park for keeping things humming around the grounds.

## JUNIOR GRADE SEASON REPORTS

### JUNIOR AND YOUTH GIRLS

Grafton fielded four girls' teams in 2022/23, one each in the Under 16 and 13 hardball competitions, and two in the Under 11 soft ball competition. This is the fourth year we have grown our numbers.

The Under 16 team I had the pleasure of coaching finished the season as Auckland Champions. This was a fine achievement for a group that has largely played together for four years, supplemented by two players who had moved up from U13s. It is this movement between teams which shows a maturity is emerging in our playing stocks.

Allrounder Charli Dunn was selected for the Eastern Districts A team which won the Auckland U17 Districts Tournament, with Charli finishing top run scorer in the tournament. Charli deservedly won the Karen Plummer Award for best female cricketer at the club for the second year running.

A further six players were selected in the EDCA B team, which finished third at the same tournament: Emma Criscillo, Ella Cross, Lily Cuttriss, Casey McAnulty, Zoe Mentjox and Lucy Shaw. They were coached by Grafton Premier cricketer Nick Robinson.

In January Lily, Casey, Ella and Zara Blackie joined a combined AUCC Grafton team in Hawkes Bay, where they finished unbeaten. Their attitude and skill gained them praise from all their opponents.

The next step for this team is to enter Premier Reserve grade in 2023/24 – just one step away from our desired goal to have Grafton back in Women's Premier Cricket. While next season will be a massive step up for the girls, it is one that they are ready for.

Our teams all had disruptive seasons due to weather. The Under 13 Lionesses returned from the previous season under the coaching of Grant Collie and Rene Pasche, they had particularly bad luck, finishing mid-table but playing fewer games than many of their opponents. Their development continued and they will step up a grade next season too.

Our two Under 11 teams, the Vixens and the Lionesses, were based largely at Melville Park early on Saturday mornings. Their enthusiasm was a joy to experience, with White Fern Suzie Bates paying the Vixens a visit. We look forward to them eventually moving to hard ball competition and expanding the base of players available for senior women's cricket back at Grafton. Thanks to Dave Murdoch and Mark Crysell for coaching our U11 teams this season.

We also have girls playing in what are largely "boys' teams". Regardless of which team they play in at the club, we are delighted at the year on year growth in our numbers. The Club also supported the two main cricket playing secondary schools in our catchment area – Western Springs College and St Mary's College – with facilities and coaching. Both schools moved up to 1A (Second) Grade and played an entertaining 3rd place playoff at Victoria Park to end the season.

The enthusiasm and positivity of the Grade was also reflected in the registration numbers for the Super Sizes event. U11's combined with U10's were the largest cohort represented in the Super Sizes event.

It is hoped that player numbers are retained for the upcoming season as the Grade transitions to U12, with the Grade offering both T20 (morning) and LO30 formats (afternoon).

## PREMIER GRADE RECORDS

Formed in September 1862 as Auckland United, the club changed its name to United to avoid confusion with the Auckland Club, which also played in the Senior Grade at the time. The proper Auckland club competition began in 1885/86, and United were one of the original teams. In 1903/04 the format was changed to one based on the district where the players resided, and the name was changed to Grafton. Although the district scheme did not last, the name remained, but with United added back to the title (although the club is still generally referred to simply as "Grafton"). It has remained as such for over 100 years, except for 1952/53 to 1954/55 when renamed Metropolitan, although the colours have changed to black and gold. **Grafton United is the only club in Auckland which has played every year in the premier competition.**

These archival records are compiled from all the material and sources currently available to the club and cover the period from 1882/83 to date. **They are by no means definitive** and if anyone can assist in any way, contact the club. This grade has also been known by other names in the past, notably Senior and District.

The + sign beside many totals indicates that not all relevant details are known (e.g. for seasons where only short scoreboards were published in newspapers, the player will have scored more runs than shown here).

In addition, NCC denotes National Club Championships and LS denotes Lloyd Seabrook Trophy.
